Verb Tenses

Simple past (single word) The action has already happened. E.g. We went home.

Simple present (single word) The action happens now; something is true, or is regular. E.g. Emmaville pupils work hard.

Past perfect (had + past participle) The action happened before something else in the past. E.g. We called round, but you had gone out

Present perfect (<u>has/have</u> + past participle)

The action has happened, but has a consequence.

E.g. She **has fixed** the bike. (Now she can go for a ride)

Past Progressive (was/were + '-ing' verb) The action progressed over time in the past.

E.g. Jim was eating his breakfast.

Past Progressive (am/are + '-ing' verb) The action progresses over time in the present. E.g. Jim **is eating** his breakfast.
