How to look after an Atlantihorse

If you are a person who likes to chill and relax then the Atlantihorse is for you.

Habitat

An Atlantihorses habitat is in the deep seas of the Atlantic Ocean, so you will need to get a fish tank that is very deep and wide. The ideal size is $10m \times 27m$. Make sure that you clean the tank every 6 weeks or buy an oxygen pump that filters the water.

Diet

The Atlantihorse has a peculiar diet. It is a pescetarian which means that it only eats fish and vegetables. However, this incredible animal is extremely allergic to brussel sprouts and cabbage. - Pink means they are too cold

Habits

They have a habit of jumping out the water and their fish tank; therefore, you need to put a lid on the top of the tank. They also have a habit of not eating their food if they are overwhelmed with too much of it, so put the food in a little bit at a time.
