Picture News Recap!

Do world leaders have a duty to help other countries?



Following news of European leaders forming a coalition to support Ukraine, this resource explored world leaders' duty to help other countries. This led to broader discussions about community, and what it means to be there for others. Is it important to have a morning routine? 17th March 2025



The UK government announced that from April, 750 schools in England will trial free breakfast clubs. This news led to conversations about morning routines and the importance of breakfast. Pupils thought about how they can best start their day.

Is it important to feel proud of where you come from? 3rd March 2025



The Times newspaper conducted a survey with Gen Z, including questions about feeling proud about living in the UK. Children discussed their opinions on where they live, and what their home and surroundings means to them. Why do we judge people based on their appearance? 24th February 2025



This resource focused on a girls' football team in York, who kickstarted a campaign, 'Girls can have short hair. Get Over It'. This was a springboard for broader discussions about judging others based on appearances, and how together we can foster inclusivity.

Supporting children with media literacy



Media literacy means helping children understand the news and other information they see, hear, or read – whether it's on TV, online, in a newspaper, or on social media.

It's about learning to ask questions, think carefully, and decide what to trust.



Why is it important?

In today's digital world, children may come across lots of messages every day. Some are true, some are opinions, and some might be misleading.

Building media literacy helps children:

- Tell the difference between facts and opinions
- Ask relevant questions to find out more
- Understand different points of view
- Stay safe and smart online
- Share their own ideas confidently

Top tips to support media literacy at home!

Look at news together

Explore different news sources. Talk about the pictures and headlines – do they tell the full story?



Talk about facts and opinions

Help your child spot what's fact (something true) and what's someone's opinion (what they think or feel).

Think about the purpose Is the information trying to inform, entertain, sell something, or persuade us?





Chat about the news

Ask your child what they've heard in the news. What do they think? What questions do they have?

Share your values

Talk about what matters to your family and how to treat others with respect – even when people have different views.



Encourage curiosity Ask: Who made this? Why did they make it? Can we trust it?

Be a role model Show your child how you check information or talk about news in a thoughtful way.

School Spotlight
