## Fairtrade at Emmaville Primary



We're so proud this year's Emmaville Fairtrade Committee - Poppy, Georgia, Mina, Louie, Annabel, Joseph, Tyler and Sophia - who have not only been working hard to promote Fairtrade in school, but have also been fundraising for the Pakistan Flood Appeal.

The committee spoke in assembly to all of the children in school about how the money that they will raise from selling Fairtrade cookies in school will go towards the appeal. Here is a little of what they said:

Pakistan is a really important producer of Fairtrade products such as cotton, tea and of course footballs. Just as we were returning to school in September, Pakistan was experiencing terrible floods. Torrential rains washed away homes, crops and bridges and a third of the country was left underwater.

More than 2 million houses were washed away; 1.2 million livestock animals were killed; 8 million people lost their homes and thousands of people, including children, died.

The Fairtrade Committee would like to raise as much money as possible for the appeal, so we have decided to donate any profit we make when we are selling Fairtrade cookies to go to the Pakistan Flood Appeal.

We hope you will support us by buying Fairtrade cookies at the Fairtrade tuck shop.

Well done to you all, it's so lovely to see you working so hard for others, and being so passionate about Fairtrade.
