What does the term offspring mean?





Offspring is the child or young of a human, animal or plant.

You are all offspring of your parents.

Your pets are all offspring of their parents.

A calf is the offspring of a cow.



A chick is the offspring of a chicken.

- 1. Cut up the pictures.
- 2. Turn them upside down so that you can't see them.
- 3. Take it in turns to turn over two pictures- are they matching offspring to the parent? If so, you can keep them and you've earned a point.
- 4. Repeat until they are all matched up.

- Look at one pair at a time what are the differences and similarities?
- Does anything surprise you?
- Why do some babies look different to their parents?
- What is it like for humans? How are we similar to our parents?

Guess who?




Today we are going to be asking questions like real scientists! Let's warm up our thinking brains with a quick game of Guess who!


