'A Twinkly Treetop Tale'


Children in KS1 will be entertaining us with their fantastic talents in this year's Christmas performances.

History - The Indus Valley

As a historian I will...

- Identify some significant events from the history of the Indus Valley civilisation and order them on a timeline.
- Experience some Indus Valley cuisine.
- Research some of the key people who discovered the Indus Valley civilisation.
- Find facts about an aspect of life in the Indus Valley Civilisation.

Maths As a mathematician I will ...

- Continue to use formal methods for addition, subtraction and multiplication.
- Use bar modelling to answer missing number problems.
- Be able to find the perimeter and area of regular shapes.
- Use my mathematical brain to answer a variety of questions within post-it note lessons.
- Continue to learn my times tables for tests.
- Regularly complete mini skills tests.

Knowledge & understanding of the world (Computing)

As a technician I will...

- Use the programme Scratch to create an animation using sequence, selection and repetition.
- Understand how an algorithm (instruction) is given by precise instructions that computers understand called coding.
- Look at given codes to identify where the errors are and reorder, re-sequence or adapt it to correct it

French

As a linguist I will...

- Learn the days of the week and the months of the year.

Science - Forces and Magnets

As a Scientist I will

- Identify forces acting on objects.
- Investigate how objects move by different forces.
- Carry out an investigation to compare how things move on different surfaces.
- Work as a team exploring how magnets work by moving a car around a track using only magnetic forces.
- Sort and group together everyday materials based on their magnetic properties.
- Predict and explain why magnetic poles will attract or repel.

Music

As a musician I will...

- Yr4- Begin to learn to play the trumpet.
- Yr3 Begin to learn how to play the penny whistle.
- Both year groups will learn about musical notation, key signatures and how to read music.
- Learn some Christmas carols/hymn and sing to an audience.
- Listen to and discuss musical genres and discuss preferences. (Information Station time.)

Knowledge & understanding of the world (Art, Design and Technology)

As an artist I will...

- Design and then make some Indus Valley inspired jewellery using a range of materials and techniques.
- Make a trading seal using clay.
- Design and draw Indus Valley clothing.
- Make a game or a toy from this time period.
- Make a Christmas decoration.
- Design and create Christmas cards.

Knowledge & understanding of the world (RE)

As a believer I will...

- Learn about the special journey of the Hajj taken by Muslims.
- Research Pilgrimages and their importance in world religions
- Learn about the major beliefs of the Islamic faith.
- Find out about the true meaning of Christmas telling the nativity story from one of the animal's point of view.

Physical development (PE)

As an athlete I will...

- Yr 4 Develop my technique and stamina when swimming
- Yr 3 Quick Cricket- Learn the rules of the game, batting and field skills and begin to take part in competitive games.
- Participate in a circuit of different fitness activities.
- Have the opportunity to plan and lead warm up activities.
- Create, teach and play their own games focusing on invasion games.

PSHE & Citizenship

As a friend I will...

- SEAL- Getting on and Falling Out.
- Growth Mindset sessions What makes intelligence?
 Can we grow intelligence?
- Learning to learn and fulfilling our potential.

Science - Heart, lungs and keeping healthy As scientists, we will learn about

- Structure of the heart
- Function of different parts of heart dual circulation system
- Gas exchange in the lungs
- Effects of smoking on the lungs
- Keeping yourself healthy

We will develop scientific skills:

- learn about and use models to explain our ideas
- use complex scientific language to describe our ideas
- Use and analyse data to understand patterns

Creative development (Art and Design)

As artists, we will look at examples of Celtic and Viking art, particularly 'knotwork'. The Lindisfarne Gospels will be used as inspiration for our own 'illuminated' letters. We will develop artistic skills in colour and line:

- Develop an understanding of how to use lines to produce patterns
- Develop brush control when painting

Computing

In our study of computing, we are learning to:

- Use the online program Sketch Up to select, use and combine software to design content by:
 - Drawing and manipulating 3D shapes
 - Adding detail to 3D drawings
 - Manipulating 3D models
 - Create complex 3D models
- Understand computing tools such as orbit, pan, zoom, erase and fill
- Use inference points to draw more accurately
- Use cross curricular maths skills to calculate perimeter and area using dimensions of shapes

History -the Viking and Anglo-Saxon struggle for the Kingdom of England to the time of Edward the Confessor.

As young historians, we will continue to develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British, local and world history, understanding how our knowledge of the past is constructed from a range of sources. We will look in depth at:

- Where the Vikings came from using atlases of Britain and Europe.
- How and why the Vikings invaded Britain, including studying the construction of a Viking longship.
- How artefacts help us to work out what life was like in Viking times, and what types of evidence sources have been found.
- The Viking attack on Lindisfarne in 793 AD.
- How the Vikings, who settled in Britain, lived what their houses were like; what clothes they wore and what they ate.
- Viking gods and what they represented.

French - Mon Corps & Les Animaux

As linguists, we will be revising, practising and developing our ability to read and speak basic French, working on simple sentences and using the correct sounds to form words. We will also be developing our understanding of French grammatical structure and the assignment of gender to nouns.

- Parts of the body and simple descriptions
- Days of the week
- Character descriptions
- Animals and pets
- Describing someone

Physical Education—we will continue to apply and develop a broader range of skills including: communication, collaboration and competition to ensure that we improve in different physical activities including:

Weekly basketball sessions with Newcastle Eagles' coach - leading to a 'Hoops for Health' Roadshow.

Weekly Yoga sessions to:

- increase flexibility, improve muscle tone, posture and balance
- learn how to be in control by using breathing techniques and calming skills
- improve well-being & self esteem

Social, Moral, Spiritual and Cultural Education

RE: we will be considering how followers of Christianity live including:

- Researching in detail the life and work of a Christian who has put their faith into action.
- producing a presentation about them
- delivering the presentation to our classmates and teachers

At Christmas we will study the story of Joseph from the Old Testament, in the Book of Genesis chapters 37 to 46, in preparation for our visit to the Newcastle Arena to see the performance.

Changing Mindsets: To ensure that we are the best learners we can be, we will be continuing to explore how a growth mindset can improve our outcomes.

Cross curricular English

As writers, we will develop our ability to communicate our ideas on paper, using correct grammar, punctuation and spelling, through:

- Constructing a glossary of technical terms.
- Writing an information text about Viking .longboats.
- Writing a newspaper report explaining the attack from the Anglo-Saxons point of view.
