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Welcome Back

It has been wonderful to welcome all the children back to school. There has been a very clam atmosphere around the building with children who are so happy to be reunited with their friends and teachers. Within classrooms, the children are eager to learn; the climate for learning is excellent in all classes. I am incredibly proud of the children, and of course of our hard-working dedicated teaching team. It is so good to all be back together again, and as our school motto shows, 'Together we grow'.

<u>Attendance</u>

Since reopening on the 8th March, the children's attendance has been very good. However, in case any of our children have to isolate at home, we are still continuing to provide on the website remote learning timetables and activities.

School Council

The School Council are enthusiastic to continue their role within Emmaville and we do not want to dampen their enthusiasm. Miss Kenyon has been considering projects for them to complete and she will be holding virtual meetings with them; the first will take place on Monday 22nd March.

Community Projects

A local artist, Simon Turner, recently contacted Emmaville about a community art project that he has planned. Miss Kenyon has been working with Simon on the development of the project that will involve the pupils of Emmaville.

The project is known as 'The Butterfly Effect' and is supported using public funding provided by Arts Council England.

The children at Emmaville need to make 1,000 origami butterflies. Simon will then put the butterflies together into a sculpture, which will be displayed in school for a week. Once displayed in school, Simon will collect the sculpture and it will be added to sculptures created by 16 other schools and care homes. In September, when all of the individual sculptures have been brought together to create one large sculpture, the sculpture will be showcased. After the sculpture has been on public display, Simon will then dismantle the model into the original 17 sculptures, and each individual sculpture will be placed into local care homes.

Throughout the process, Simon will be making a video documenting the project. It is hoped that in November the video will be shared with the children to view.

We feel that this is a lovely community project for our children to be involved in. We hope that 'The Butterfly Effect' will bring much joy to the residents of local care homes.

Simon will also be helping Miss Kenyon and the pupils to create their own 'Butterfly Effect' sculpture that will be displayed in the school library.

Crawcrook Park

On Monday 29th March, the children can bring a boiled egg to school that they will be able to decorate and enter in their class Easter egg competition. Class teachers will award prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

We still want to host our annual Family Easter Egg competition. We ask that families who wish to enter the competition make and photograph their entries, which should then be posted on Seesaw by Tuesday 30th March. Winners will be announced in the school's virtual assembly that will take place on the morning of Thursday 1st April.

Easter Party/Disco

The children at Emmaville like to 'Boogie on Down', so we thought let's have a virtual disco. This will take place on the afternoon of Thursday 1st April. On the morning of the 1st, the children should come dressed in party/disco clothes, they may even fancy dressing in an Easter theme, it is entirely up to them. As well as dancing the afternoon away, we will throw in a few party games and treats.

Easter Bunny Hunt

Miss Kenyon and the School Council will also be organising an egg hunt for each class, more information to follow about this.

We are looking forward to sharing the Easter plans that we have for our children.

Just to remind parents, school closes for the Easter break on Thursday 1st April and we reopen on Tuesday 20th April.


