Now it's time to use what we know about the characters to write an **internal monologue**. Remember that this is a little like a diary entry, written in the first person and containing the thoughts and emotions of a character. However, a monologue is written in the present tense, and has the added advantage of revealing the character's thoughts in the 'real time' of a scene, which means that the character does not necessarily have to survive... A brief recap of adverbials:

Adverbials of time tell us <u>when</u> something happens:

now	then	soon	yesterday	before	after
once	a we	ek ago	on Tuesday	last night	

Adverbials of **place** tell us **<u>where</u>** something happens:

here	there	under th	ne tree	in the	classroom
up ahead	behin	d us	in the sk	Σ γ	to the left

Adverbials of **manner** tell us <u>how</u> something happens:

suddenly quietly in a flash without thinking cautiously grinning from ear to ear as if in slow motion

Adverbials of **frequency** tell us <u>how often</u> something happens:

twice a week never always on Fridays

whenever I can hardly ever frequently
