Dear Families,

We continue to face a number of disruptions to school life as a result of the virus. Can we please ask that parents/carers make sure they use a Lateral Flow test on their child/children if they display any of the symptoms of the virus.

We apologise that there has been no news bulletin for a couple of weeks, this has been due to staff absence. We are trying very hard not to allow staff absence to affect the children, but we are aware that the slightest change can be tricky for some of our little people. Please be assured that we will endeavour to try our very best to offer continuity for the children, but in the current climate this is proving rather difficult. However, I very much appreciate your patience and support.

School Meal Vouchers

School will be issuing the vouchers to cover the holiday period, week commencing Monday 21st to Sunday 27th February.

Gateshead Council has placed funds with Edenred, and all eligible families will receive £30 per child for this holiday period in order to continue to support them during this time of year with increased energy and food bills.

The Council is also intending to help with vouchers for the Easter holiday period 2022, although the normal value of £15 per child per week, will most likely be what families receive.

Online Safety

Although we regularly remind children about the importance of keeping themselves safe whilst online, a number of activities were planned for Safer Internet Day which was on Tuesday 8th February. Can we just remind parents/carers that during the school day, the children are only permitted to drink water.


