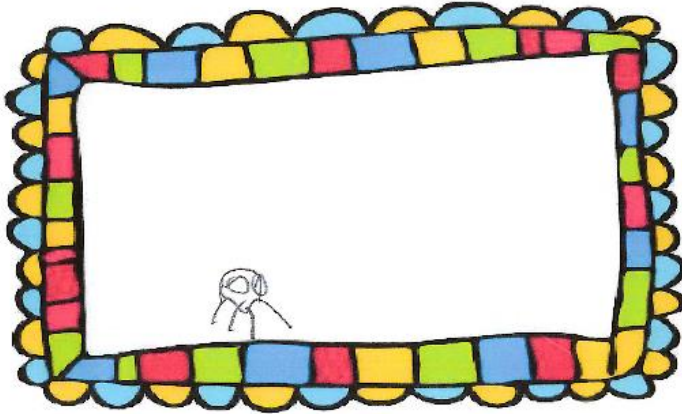


The plants life cycle

Plants disperse their seeds in different ways.


Explosion

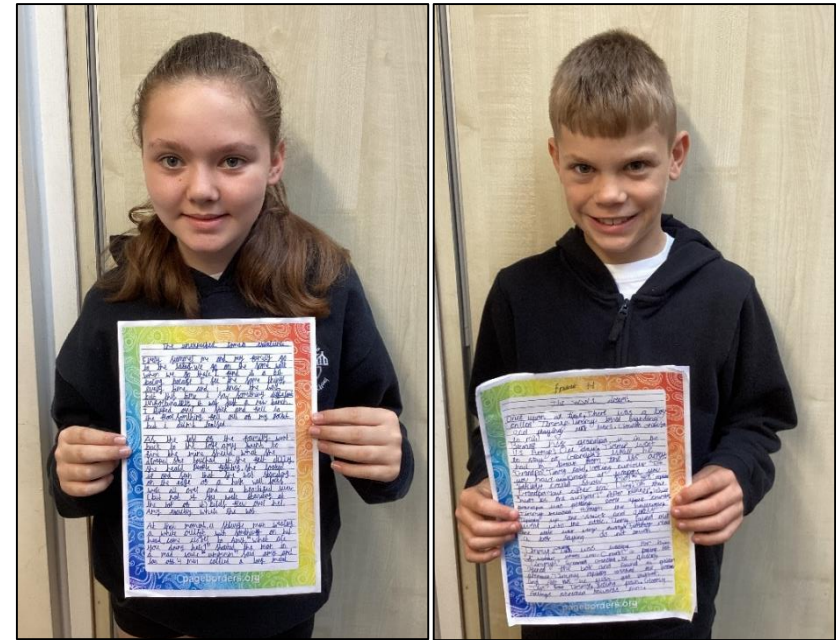
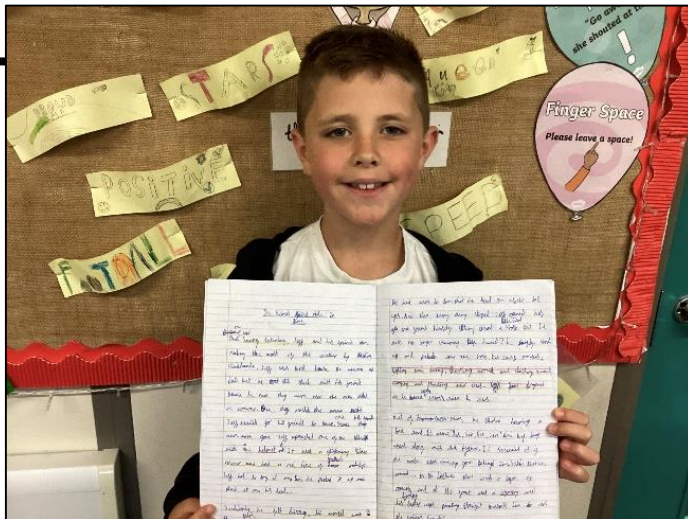


### The Helmet Sized Hole in time

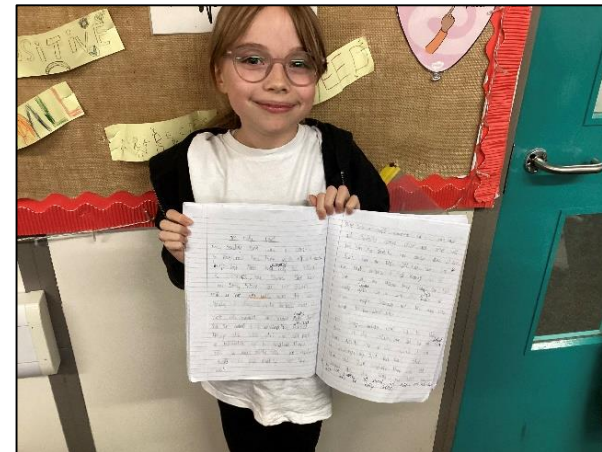

# Year 4



### How to make Telekinesis

Telekinesis is a very strong power. You can pick up objects without using your hands. You can mind read, and you can even solve impossible equations if you have telekinesis. Follow on to know how to make telekinesis.
