#### How to geocache



Are you and your family thinking of something to do in the great outdoors? If so, then geocaching is for you and your family because it is an easy and fantastic way to get outside and keep active whilst bonding and exploring the whole globe! These instructions will guide you to learn how to geocache.

In order to have a successful family trip, equipment should be fully checked before using. These are the things you need for setting out on your adventure:

- A global positioning system (GPS), make sure you bring spare batteries
- A first aid kit incase of a medical emergency.
- Enough food and water top last your duration of your activity, and maybe extra incase needed for emergency.
- Compass in case you get lost while using a GPS, and incase there is no signal for your GPS.
- Clothes to make sure you are the correct temperature throughout your adventure.
- Pen and paper to help you find challenges.
- An ordinance survey map.
- A spare pair of shoes/wellies incase it is muddy.

These simple instructions will allow anybody to arrive at the intended location.

- When you arrive, turn on your GPS, remember to place the GPS still and flat on the user's hand.
- 2. After that, locate the way point to start your family trips and bonding time.
- 3. Once the destination has been found by the user, begin looking for all of your challenges.
- 4. When you and your family have completed the cache make sure that you put the box or container back in the same position where it had been hidden in.
- 5. In addition, find the next way point and start the process all over again until all of the caches have been found.

In particular be aware of all of the wildlife but be very careful if you come across an adder as an adder is a poisonous snake. If your GPS starts to beep or vibrate, do not panic because it is telling you that you are near your cache it only bleeps or vibrates if you are 10 to 20 meters away from your cache.

By following these simple instructions, will lead to a perfect family trip. Similarly be mindful, however that there may be occasions where there is no signal. So the user will need to pull out the traditional base plate compass.

Now if a user and their family are bored, you don't have to think of what to do... just go geocaching!


