The teachers are always exploring ways of extending the children's learning and our children are always up for a challenge. Many thanks to the Year 1 parents for supporting their children to prepare for the Year 1 Phonics Screen that has taken place this week. We are delighted with the progress the children have made over the last two and a half terms, and we hope that their progress is reflected in the results of this week's screen. Please be aware that if your child does not manage to pass the screen this year they will have the opportunity to resit it when they are in Year 2. Children make progress at their own rate and we congratulate them on their attitude and effort, recognition should be shown in this way, not just through the result of a test.

Congratulations to all of the Year 2 children for managing to complete their Special Missions (SATs). I was delighted when the special delivery arrived for them, what a wonderful surprise and reward the lanyards were for their efforts. I loved the photograph that Miss McPherson shared on her class page, the children looked very proud as they showed off their 'Special Mission' Lanyards.

Last Monday (3rd June) the Year 6 pupils, Mr Saddington, Miss Woolard, Miss Rochester and I set off for the annual visit to France and Belgium. What a week it was, with so many experiences for the children to enjoy.

Throughout the week, the children were able to practise their French, as well as a little bit of Flemish when they explored the cobbled streets and canals in the city of Bruges and the ancient historical town of Ypres. At Boulogne-Sur-Mer market the children purchased gifts and some very 'tasteful' accessories, however, not sure the parents would agree with the boys' choice of dollar chains; oh yes they went to town on their chain purchases! Ooh, and there were some very colourful sombreros purchased later on in the week.

During the visit, the children used the information that they had researched in advance, information about family members and local Crawcrook and Ryton people who fought in the First World War. They were either able to find the graves at the Tyne Cot Commonwealth War Cemetery or the names of family members on the famous Menin Gate Memorial Bridge in Ypres.

At the In Flanders Museum, they had the opportunity to listen to accounts of the Christmas Truce from the perspective of German, Belgium, French and English soldiers. They were also able to look at artefacts that had been donated by war veterans and their families. The opportunity to be in France and Belgium during the commemorative events for the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, made the children's visit to watch the Last Post in Ypres extremely poignant.

The visit to the biggest aquarium in Europe, Nausicaa, is always a special treat for the children as is the day spent at the Bellewaerde Theme Park. Throughout the visit the children were a delight, showing great enthusiasm for all that we had planned for them.

Thank you children for being an absolute delight last week, it was such a pleasure for us to spend quality time with you.



A Day to Remember

This itinerary is suitable for those who are interested in the historical First World War. First, you start with an amazing trip to In Flanders Field Museum, which then leads you to the moving Tyne Cot Cemetery. Finally, you end the day at the Menin Gate Memorial Arch in Ypres.

In Flanders Field Museum.

In Flanders Field Museum is situated in the Cloth Market in Ypres, which is dedicated to WW1. There are interactive wrist bands that can be used for scanning historical items. Different stations are also interactive which helps give a better understanding about the first World War. Maps and pictures are placed around the museum to show images of Ypres before and after WW1. In Flanders Field Museum is also a place of remembrance. There are many artefacts such as bullets, helmets, guns and soldiers uniform. There is also a souvenir shop, which is suitable for all ages.

Tyne Cot Cemetery

For those who wish to find their relative's graves, stewards are on hand to help find graves using a gridded system. There are over 11,000 graves, some were 'un-named'. They are marked: 'Known unto God'. Each section has a Roman numeral and number to help locate a particular grave. The cemetery is looked after extremely well; therefore, it is immaculate.

Menin Gate Last Post

Menin Gate Memorial Arch was built for the soldier's bodies that were never found. There are 54,000 soldiers from the British Empire remembered there. You can witness the Last Post Ceremony, it happens everyday and is played on a bugle. Silence descends about 19:50, and then the Last Post is played. Visitors can also write in the book of remembrance.

From looking at historical items, to paying your respects at the Menin Gate, this will be a day to remember. Any visitor can enjoy themselves in Ypres because of what it has waiting for you.
