
During the workshop last Tuesday, Kate spoke about how she was

As you probably know by now the Tokyo Olympics start on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> July.





The largest known dinosaur with feathers was a 7-metre-long Tyrannosaur that weighed as much as 10 male gorillas








The human nose can detect


Bactrian camels are able to smell the scent of certain water bacteria. allowing the camels to locate water from up to 80 km away.
